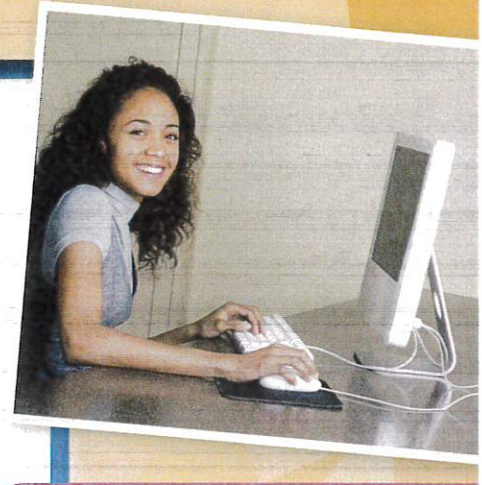

You should learn to use the Internet for research as soon as you can explore the web. You need to judge websites to decide which ones to select. You need to know which are safe.

A good website can give you a great deal of accurate information. However, not everything that appears on the Internet is factual. On some topics the truth changes almost every day. Anyone can put up a web page, and some web pages look as if they contain facts, but they don't. They might just contain one person's ideas or opinions about a subject.

How can you tell whether a website is a reliable source? One way is to look at who created the site. When you see the name of a well-known group, you can expect that the site will be a good source. The American Library Association has a site with links to websites that carry its seal of approval. KidSpace at the Internet Public Library site also has a list of good research sites.

Here's an important research rule to practice. You can't copy information from the Internet and claim you wrote it. Copying from the Internet is like copying from a book. It's like copying from other students. Pretending you created something when you didn't is illegal, and it's wrong.
