Written accounts of the Olympic Games go back almost 3,000 years to the year 776 B.C. The games were named after Olympia, the site in Greece where the games were played. The Olympics were probaly linked to the festivals celebrating the god Zeus.

No one alive can remmeber exactly how the games were played, but written records provide some important details.

The games were held every four years—a time period that came to be known as an Olympiad. At first, the only event was the **stade**, a race of almost 200 meters. Soon, other events were added. They included longer races, discus throwing, jumping with weights, wrestling, boxing, **pankration** (a blend of wrestling and boxing), and events with horses.

The Olympic athalete was a free male who was a citizen of Greece. The spectators were other men and unmarried women. Married women did not have the priviledge of watching the games. Perhaps some thought it would be improper for them to see men other than their husbands prespire and flex their mussles. Married women were also not allowed to participate in the games. Amature female athletes could compete in separate games honoring the goddess Hera, Zeus's wife.

Fortunately, today's Olympic Games are quite diffirent from the ancient games. One way they are similer, however, is that victory is still the ultimate goal.
