Wordflunt

Cooking is an art. It's also a science. It is understood that it would be foolish to make a chemical solution without knowing what you were doing. The same is true in cooking. Of course, one will not end up with a pollutant if one adds an extra tablespoon of salt to a pot of goulash, but the goodness of the dish will be at risk. To develop your aptitude with certain cooking routines, consider these scientific explanations.

You go to the supermarket and buy asparagus. As it cooks in fluid (often water) it turns bright green. Do not assume it will stay that way. If asparagus is overcooked, the cell walls break down and acid is released. This makes the asparagus turn grey.

When red cabbage is cooking, heat breaks down the acidic pigment. This changes it to alkaline and the cabbage color changes. Adding a teaspoon of vinegar to the cabbage causes a renewal of the acidity, and the cabbage turns red again.

There is proof that adding salt to pasta water raises the temperature of the water. Then, when you introduce the pasta to the water, it cooks more quickly.

Baking soda helps baked goods rise through a reaction in which tiny carbon dioxide bubbles distribute themselves through the batter.

Continue the science of cooking to improve your meals. Say good-bye to bad meals forever.
