Spelling and the William Process

Writing anything—a friendly letter, a paper for school—usually follows a process. The writing process has five steps. It might look like this if you tried to draw a picture of it:



Part of the writing process forms a loop. That is because not every writing task is the same. It is also because writers often jump back and forth between the steps as they change their minds and think of new ideas.

Here is a description of each step:

PREWRITING This is thinking and planning ahead to help you write.

DRAFTING This means writing your paper for the first time. You usually just try to get your ideas down on paper. You should spell correctly those words that you do know. Attempt to spell those that you don't. You can fix them later.

REVISING This means fixing your final draft. During this step, you rewrite, change, and add words.

EDITING You are ready to edit when you feel you have said all you want to say. Proofread your paper for errors in spelling, grammar, and punctuation. Be sure to use a print or online dictionary to check your spelling.

PUBLISHING This is making a copy of your writing and sharing it with your readers. Put your writing in a form that your readers will enjoy.

Confident spellers are better writers. Confident writers understand their own writing process better. Know how the five steps best fit the way you write.

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Being a good speller can help make you a more confident writer. Writing often can make you a better writer. Here are some ideas to get you started.

Narrative writing tells a story about real or imaginary events.

You might...

- write a story about your first visit to someplace new.
- write a story about something that happened in your neighborhood.
- write a story about an experience you've had in seventh grade that you could share with a sixth grader.
- write a story about a time when you did something you thought you could not do.

Argument writing makes a claim and supports it with reasons, examples, and evidence.

You might...

- try to convince your parents to let you purchase a new bicycle.
- try to convince your friends to start a neighborhood recycling program.
- try to convince your school administrators to abolish a rule you disagree with.
- write to convince the United States Congress to establish a new holiday to honor a particular person.


Informative/Explanatory writing explores a topic, a relationship, or a process.

You might...

- write a report about the effect of daily exercise on health.
- write about a famous athlete's career.
- inform your classmates on how to ride a bicycle safely.
- describe an unusual or beautiful landscape. Take a photo or sketch the place, and use the image to help you describe it.
