

We can learn a lot about the past from art. Records of earlier lives come to us through sculpture, paintings, and written descriptions. The arts are a window into the picturesque country living in rural England and the elegance of wealthy European royalty.

Such paintings might show us the noisy fun of a town festival. In the painting we can see fancy treats, a colorful carousel, people on stilts, acrobats masquerading as clowns, and a menagerie of exotic animals. There are also villagers with expressions of amazement on their faces. Looking at such a scene, we can almost hear the laughter and music. We can also share the joy of children as they receive their souvenirs.

Other paintings reveal the formality of dating and courtship in high society. Marriages were arranged by two families. Visits between the young fiancé and fiancée were planned.
